Day Care Centre.

The doctors and children are all well and the centre is working smoothly. Unfortunately, despite having a lot of work done on the roof earlier this year the heavy rains have found the weak spots and water has been getting into the treatment room. Due to high winds and torrential rains no one is prepared to venture on the roof to carry out repairs until after the monsoons.

Starting Point School.

There are currently 35 children at St. Point and Jane had to turn some hopefuls away deferring them until June 2014!

The coconuts have once again caused problems falling during the monsoons and breaking the roof tiles. The job of 'coconut plucker' is one that no-one wants these days as it is dangerous and the net we had strung over the school roof has rotted over the last few years. We now have to put up with water pouring into the building until the monsoons end and the tiles can be replaced and new netting erected.

The school building had to be rewired last month and the washing machine needed repairs. Jane has managed to find a part-time teacher, Maria, who started on August 1st to assist Welly and to cover for her as she is spending more and more time visiting the sponsored children and the schools they attend.

The older children will be completing their schooling next year and already two of them Rupa & Rubina have asked if they can go on to further education.

Damedem.

Hazel returned to the UK to renew her visa on 12^{th} August 2013 and I am indebted to her for this contribution:

The monsoon was very heavy this year so Goa is looking wonderfully lush and green. We are all feeling rather sad because Sister Jessie has been transferred to work in a home for the elderly in Karnataka. Sister Jessie has been looking after the children for the past twelve years so will be sorely missed by the children to whom she has been 'mother' for most of their lives. The new Superior is Sister Coshav and we wish her a long and happy association with the children and staff. Since the last newsletter our numbers have increased by four children and Romeo a puppy! The children are Asma a 13 yr old girl and her brother Sadiq aged 8 yrs, a girl Kally aged 9 yrs and a boy Ragu aged 4 yrs.

Deedar passed his 10th standard exams and has happily returned to live with his grandfather near Margao. We now have 33 children.

Arbind & Seby continue working in their jobs and Parsuram is now working at the Caritas Holiday Home in Panjim.
