Day Care Centre.

Starting Point.

Because the Easter holidays which commenced in mid-April (due to the lateness of Easter this year) the six week summer holidays followed immediately meaning the school has been closed for eight weeks and will reopen on June 6th. Some children will have left to go to main stream schools and there will be a new intake to replace them.

The children who attend Starting Point come from different states, each of which has its own language. One of the teachers asked a little girl Soumya from the state of Karnataka "what do you call mosquitoes?" to which the girl replied "oh no miss we don't have to call them at all, they come by themselves"

On another occasion a teacher asked a little boy Pallav "why do you always talk whilst I am teaching?" to which after thinking about it he replied "probably because you are always teaching whilst I am talking"!.

During a math class Vallie asked Naksh what he would have if she gave him I pineapple, 1 banana, 1 orange and 5 strawberries. He said "fruit salad!".

Khushi was asked if her mother helped her with her homework. She said "No, My mum did my homework all by herself".
